Proceedings MS. ANDERSON: Hello, everyone, can everybody hear on the conference 4 line? MR. APICELLA: Yes, we can hear you, Marlyn. Let's call the meeting to order. This is November meeting for 8 the Yonkers Joint Construction Board 9 and let's start with a role call, the 10 first is Mayor Mike Spano. MR. LANDI: Represented by Anthony 11 12 Landi, Deputy Mayor. 1.3 MS. ANDERSON: Doctor Quezada. 14 DR. QUEZADA: Here. 15 MS. ANDERSON: Reverend Lopez. REVEREND LOPEZ: Here. 16 17 MS. ANDERSON: Ronald Matten. 1.8 MR MATTEN. Here 19 MS. ANDERSON: Robert Rijos. 20 (Via phone.) 21 MS. ANDERSON: Hector Lopez. Not 2.2 present. Pastor Haskill (Ph). Not 23 present. 1 Proceedings 2 MS. ANDERSON: We have a guorum. So I am going to start with_-- we have to skip that. 5 The next item is the minutes. Currently we don't have all the board 6 members who were present for the September 7th meeting so we are going 9 to move past that and go straight into 1.0 number three on the agenda which is Reports and Updates. 11 12 So the next is updates for the 13 Justice Sonia Sotomayor Community 1.4 School. We'll start with Kevin Austin 15 from Savin who is going to do the first 16 update and then it is going to be Joe 17 Tola and do the construction updates 18 first. 19 MR. TOLA: So thank you, everyone, 2.0 for taking the time. Its nice to be in 21 a room together in a long time. So we 22 have a Power Point presentation to show 23 you, the progress that has taken place 2.4 since our last meeting. 25 So currently you are looking at DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

4 Proceedings 2 the concrete placement of the foundation walls followed by the next picture which is the foundation walls but you actually see the concrete that was placed. You see the form work that has been removed as we were getting ready to clear that area. 9 The next picture is waterproofing 1.0 of the foundation wall. If you 11 remember, Russ previously mentioned the 1.2 bathtub and all the items that we are 13 doing. That is basically completing 1.4 that system to prevent any groundwater 15 or stormwater from above going into the 16 building. 17 The next slide that you are 18 looking at is the compaction of the 19 foundation walls at the first floor. That is basically a cafeteria area that 21 you are looking at, and the concrete 22 you are looking at is the basement of 23 the building. 2.4 The next one is form work, 25 foundation work along the 117. That is DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

Proceedings basically by the loading dock cafeteria 2 area that you are looking at. 4 The next slide is foundation work along Lawrence Street closer to the church. The next one is some footing work for first floor piers. The next one is the underground electrical conduit at the first floor. 9 10 That is basically by the cafeteria so 11 you can see the church in front of you. Similar to the next two slides, the underground plumbing work, storm lines 1.3 being roughed in. That shows the 14 1.5 compaction taking place. That is actually the cafeteria area. That's 16 17 some backfilling at the same area around the underground plumbing pipes, 1.8 sanitary pipes. That is the excavation 19 20 along the Radford property. We have a 21 retaining wall there. 22 The next slide should be the 23 actual concrete work that was placed so eventually that green silk screen fence you see there, that is on the Radford DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

Proceedings property, the neighbor's property. That will get shifted over back to our property, and any restoration that needs to be done on the Radford property will be done. For example, they had some, I am going to call it some flat concrete walk that we were required to replace on their property. 9 10 Continuing with the first floor, 11 that is the connector working its way 12 over to the community building. That's some footing work. What you are 1.3 looking at now is the shoring in place, 14 1.5 the PVC pipe, the dewatering system at the community building, similar shot. 16 17 The next one is a similar picture. We got down to grade there and in the 1.8 next slide you will see we are starting 19 to rebuild with the structure, all 21 backfill and get them ready for 2.2 footings and foundation walls so that's 23 pretty much what you have in this slide show. Our next milestone which we are DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.cor

1 Proceedings working toward is in the middle of November we are going to start seeing--May 14th the crane shows up. In the next couple of days the steel starts. REVEREND LOPEZ: You said May? MR. TOLA: I am sorry, that was the original date. November 14th the 9 crane shows up. We start erecting 1.0 steel right after that. Steel starts 11 showing up next week sometime. 12 Right now we are going through the 13 process checking the anchor bolts, 1.4 making sure the bearing plates are 15 grouted. We have the testing company 1.6 there inspecting, monitoring all that. So by November 15th, 16th we should start seeing steel being 18 erected. We'll start with all the 19 2.0 steel in the basement first and then 21 we'll start working our way out of the 22 ground and then we'll back up. 23 If you remember earlier, I was 2.4 saying the cafeteria area, loading dock 2.5 area, that will be the last piece of DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

Proceedings steel. That is against 117. That will be erected and connecting the entire building for the academic side of the building. Obviously we'll come back and tie in the connector to the community building. That is basically all masonry with steel on top so that's 9 where we are with our next milestone. 1.0 We had a scheduled meeting today 11 where we presented our schedule. 1.2 Riverso had not had an opportunity to 13 go through it, he will go through it 1.4 and comment on it but from Piazza's 15 schedule he is basically showing two to 1.6 three weeks behind showing a March completion. We believe that the December completion can be met and get 18 19 the key is to get the steel up where we 2.0 can make up a lot of time. 21 MR. MATTEN: That is a significant 22 difference. You said December? 23 MR. TOLA: December is what we are 2.4 showing and is definitely doable from 25 where we are looking at. DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.cor

2	MR. MATTEN: I am just saying that
3	is a significant difference.
4	MR. TOLA: It is two months.
5	Piazza is showing the beginning of
6	March and that includes the community
7	building, not just the academic
8	building.
9	MR. DAVIDSON: It is very
10	contentious. It is a big gap.
11	MR. MATTEN: What do you see it
12	after that?
13	MR. DAVIDSON: We can see it in
1 4	pieces, depending on what they finish.
15	We imagine we'll be, you know, getting
16	the CO for the academic building prior
17	to the community building so we can get
18	the core academic function set up first
19	but the inspections are done by the
2 0	local fire inspector so we have to wait
21	for a third-party. If I can just add a
22	couple of things, Joe.
23	The key milestone is the steel.
2 4	We had to deal with the supply chain
25	issue related to the steel columns so
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1	Proceedings
2	that was resolved and those are under
3	fabrication but there was a problem
4	obtaining four story steel columns due
5	to the supply chain issues and we had
6	to deal with that through the chain
7	process.
8	We are still struggling to get
9	utilities across Van Cortlandt.
10	Yonkers city streets are rich with
11	utilities and some of which no one
12	knows what they do, and I think that is
13	in the final stages right now and we
1 4	are still hoping to get that crossing
15	settled before the deepest part of
16	winter to get the plates off the
17	street.
18	MR. TOLA: Nancy was working with
19	the City of Yonkers. She received a
20	call today to coordinate some of that
21	work, the utility crossing work.
22	MR. DAVIDSON: It is complicated
23	and it is not that unusual but it is
2 4	getting there. The good news, there
25	really has been no change in the
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Proceedings design. The drawings are holding. All the exterior materials that were submitted are the ones specified which is a little unusual which is a good thing, and we expect by the end of the year we'll be able to let the board know that they can see a mock-up of the exterior materials including the brick, 1.0 metal panels, the windows, which is a 11 required step. 12 You saw the foundation and the 13 waterproofing are well under way. Soil 14 conditions basically and the water 15 table levels are pretty much exactly as anticipated which is comforting. 16 17 We are coordinating the trades. 18 It is well under way. Everything that 19 you see is all coordinated between the 2.0 trades. The electricians did move a 21 lot of conduit under ground which is a benefit to the owner. It had minor 23 costs to it but it gets a lot of work 24 out of the ceiling. We continue to coordinate with the 25 DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

12 Proceedings schools on security, hardware and finishings. That process is ongoing, and the one area that we are still sort of working out design is the interior of the health clinic, and again, we are working with the school and their vendor to finalize the build-out and 9 that's it. 1.0 MS. ANDERSON: Thank you, Russ. 11 Any questions, Robert, Joe, before we 12 move on to Kevin? Okay. So Kevin, go 13 ahead. 14 MR. AUSTIN: Thank you very much 15 for having me here. We'll direct our 16 attention to the screen, hopefully, if 17 it is not too small. 18 MR. BADALATO: These documents are 19 in the packet as well. MR. AUSTIN: So either from the 2.0 21 screen or the packet we will take a look at-- I am just basically taking 23 the prime contractor, the current 24 status of the financials. 25 JoDI for the demolition is a DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.cor

2	hundred percent completed so their work
3	has been a hundred percent paid out as
4	noted. Piazza, as of September 30th.
5	Again, these financials are as of
6	September 30th.
7	We have made five payments for six
8	million dollars to date, roughly 18
9	percent of the contract. Lombardo,
10	again, the GC is taking the heavier
11	portion so therefore we don't have a
12	lot on Lombardo for plumbing or heating
13	and electrical, so on the HVAC we are
1 4	definitely short as far as payments,
15	and you can see here there only has
1 6	been one payment to date, the reason
17	being we had issues with the MWBE
18	portion of that. They have not
19	complied with the contract
2 0	requirements.
21	The independent compliance officer
22	is pursuing addressing that issue with
23	the contractor. However, we are
2 4	backing that as the program manager to
25	insure that they actually fulfill what
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1	Proceedings
2	their contract obligations are when the
3	project and the award was made back in
4	January.
5	We subsequently made two more
6	payments since this date so therefore
7	they are caught up with their current
8	payment as well, so on the contingency
9	balance as noted here we have 2.3
10	million dollars still in our
11	contingency so therefore roughly five
12	percent. A little less than that is
13	still available within the contingency
1 4	for the construction.
15	Moving on. On the incidentals are
16	just basic monthly invoices for the
17	architect PM/CM, the ICO-Landon and
18	Rian, and we will have an update from
19	Rick with Capital Market Advisors with
20	regard to where we stand with the
21	capitalized interest. That will come
22	into play once the final bond, the
23	second issuance of the second traunch
2 4	is completed in the next final
25	finalized in the next five weeks so I
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2 think December 6th is the date for closing for that. So that's our current September financials. I will switch over to the actual budget. So this wasn't working at all when we came here so I am working it off my phone. On the left-hand side is the--1.0 as of January 2nd when the award was 11 made was the total contract and budget 12 was for construction as well as 13 incidentals, so as of January 28th 14 going all the way down and-- ${\tt I}$ am 15 sorry, you couldn't hear us? 16 MS. ANDERSON: Go ahead. 17 MR. AUSTIN: As of January 28th 18 our budget that was presented to the 19 board based on the award was 75.6 2.0 million dollars. Since that time, of 21 course since January 28th we had a 22 number of adjustments with regard to 23 the budget that takes us to what the 24 final borrowing is going to be for 80

million dollars. Roughly that includes

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Proceedings

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16 Proceedings additional demo contractor change orders of a hundred thousand. To be noted there, though, is that we did have credits of \$80,000 back from the contractor. That contractor, that was mainly due to expedited payments as well as some of the allowance that was 9 originally in the bid was not used, so 1.0 therefore to offset some of the 11 additional costs pertaining to change 12 the orders. MR. MATTEN: So the \$100,789 is 13 14 net change orders? 15 MR. AUSTIN: No, that was the addition so as of January there was 16 17 basically \$300,000 of that 3.6 and then 18 the final was 3.7 that we previously 19 showed, so the difference is a hundred 2.0 thousand dollars. 21 MR. MATTEN: It is net? 22 MR. AUSTIN: Yes. Yes. My 23 apologies. Again we are not carrying 24 new costs pertaining to delay or 25 material escalation, but just as a DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.cor

2	note, we have that as a line item just
3	to show that it is not included and
4	that there is no amount for that.
5	The health suite was not part of
6	the January award bit so we are
7	carrying a budget of A\$400,000 in total
8	for that and potentially we do not have
9	an estimate as of yet for the 117
10	repairs of \$450,000. That is all on
11	the construction side.
12	On the incidental side it was
13	decided that the capitalized interest
1 4	would be included in the 80 million or
15	as part of the 80 million so therefore
16	since that was not carried originally I
17	added it to my budget.
18	Also we have other, you know,
19	relatively expected incidentals that
2 0	were adjustments since January.
21	Highlighting. There is no parking
22	included so therefore while there may
23	have been previous discussions, even
2 4	the appraisal that was approved by the
2 5	board, there is no set consideration
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1	Proceedings
2	for parking as it relates to site,
3	purchasing, demo, site work or any of
4	the such.
5	MR. MATTEN: I would like to go
6	back to the change orders. So there
7	was also delay claims with the change
8	orders that we are not honoring, they
9	are not showing up either, right?
10	MR. AUSTIN: Yes.
11	MR. MATTEN: Just a round number
12	on what those delay claims are.
13	MR. AUSTIN: We are going to
1 4	discuss that.
15	VOLINO: We'll cover that in the
16	legal update in the executive session.
17	MR. AUSTIN: Originally we had the
18	higher amount for the insurance,
19	however, we were able to reduce that by
20	\$300,000 for the builder's risk. Of
21	course we have some additional costs in
22	order to have that amount but we'll
23	discuss that when we discuss the
2 4	cameras, but just overall originally I
25	was carrying \$500,000 for overall
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1 Proceedings 2 insurance, so now we are carrying \$200,000 but that reduced our budget by three \$300,000. We have an incidental contingency of \$400,000, so again making sure, you know, we don't know what the future is going to hold a year from now. As you move towards getting furniture, 1.0 equipment and other items you cannot 11 lock in prices for those items, you 12 have to wait until you get closer to 13 the actual installation date as well as 14 you do not want to install older 15 equipment necessarily, you want to wait until-- and hopefully the market will 16 17 be in a better position too a year from 18 now when you are ready for that. So 19 ultimately that entire right-hand 2.0 column, activity since January that has 21 impacted the budget, we went from 75 22 million, we added four million, 4.3 23 million. That is how we arrived at the 24 borrowing of 80 million dollars, the 25 total, and that is the financial update DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

20 1 Proceedings of our monthly update of the expenditures, what is paid to date by the contractor, by the consultant, and this is the budget overall for the borrowing of those items. DR. QUEZADA: The amount for the health suite, \$400,000, is that for the 9 construction of the health suite? MR. AUSTIN: I think Russ had 1.0 11 originally provided \$277,000 for the 12 completion, so some of it is part of 13 the actual bid, just the physical 14 location. There may be a few other 15 items, and then to build it out was 16 estimated a few months back at maybe 17 277, so I am carrying 400 because at 18 what point in time will you know what 19 the design is going to be, what is 2.0 going to be included. 21 MR. MATTEN: It is built out. 22 MR. DAVIDSON: All the mechanical 23 plumbing we kept in the base bid based 24 on our design so that is all purchased. 25 Some of that you can maybe move around DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.cor

3	construction for the health suite
4	portion we took out because we weren't
5	confident that it met the tenant's
6	needs.
7	The portion of that area that
8	serves as the school nurses office is
9	in the base bid so we think this is a
10	very generous number.
11	MR. MATTEN: Will the person
12	will the entity that is occupying the
13	health suite, will they be supplying
1 4	their own equipment?
15	MR. DAVIDSON: That's one of the
16	reasons we held it off and Doctor
17	Quesada's office is trying to set up a
18	meeting with the provider to create a
19	school based health clinic that meets
2 0	the state requirements and we need to
21	work out, you know, what the lab needs
22	before we can finalize the design,
23	issue bulletins to the contractor and
2 4	this will be done by the chain order
2 5	process.

2	DR. QUESADA: The provider is St.
3	Joseph's.
4	DR. GIUFFRIDA: You are going to
5	white board this health center for
6	\$400,000?
7	MR. DAVIDSON: We are building it
8	out.
9	DR. GIUFFRIDA: Build it out. Is
10	it our responsibility or the vendors?
11	MR. DAVIDSON: Yonkers will own
12	it. They are just going to operate it,
13	not a tenant.
1 4	DR. QUEZADA: It will strictly be
15	a student clinic for the most part.
16	MS. ANDERSON: And the community?
17	DR. QUEZADA: I don't believe the
18	hospital is able to obtain any
19	community health clinic. The state
20	will not give them a permit. We are
21	still having those discussions but it
22	will be virtually impossible for them
23	to obtain, you know, a permit from the
2 4	state. However, we have experience
25	with health tenants right now and we
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1 Proceedings 2 have all the ways of servicing the community when they need it. REVERAND LOPEZ: We are talking students as in not necessarily those enrolled in the school but those of student age in community. DR. QUEZADA: For the most part. 9 Right now we have examples. For 1.0 instance, school 25 we have a health 11 clinic which works with both students 12 from school 25 and students from 13 Riverside High School so we are 14 basically covering that community 15 through that partnership. REVEREND LOPEZ: That's 16 17 Montefiore, right? 18 DR. QUEZADA: That's Montefiore. MR. DAVIDSON: It will have a four 19 2.0 cot infirmary, two exam rooms, two 21 counselors offices, administrative 22 area, lab room, private toilet room. 23 It is a real health clinic. 24 MS. 23	you have on the screen the report we
2 4	provided for the period July 1, 2022 to

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1 Proceedings 2 MS. ANDERSON: No, we don't have those. Can you e-mail those to me and I will distribute it to the group? MS. WILKERSON: Sure. There is a lag because what we are reporting on is money that has been provided to the contractors and then we received proof 9 from the contractors that the money had 1.0 actually been received by the MWBE in 11 the form of canceled checks or ETFs and 12 their request for payment as well, so 13 at the time of this report we had 14 originally the members for ${\tt MWBE}$ for 15 minority business was at 20 percent. Those were the goals that were 16 17 established for the project for women on business participation 10 percent, 18 19 and for overall combined, 30 percent. 2.0 Our contractors came in with a 21 projected combined MWBE participation number of 13 percent and that's for 22 23 minority, and women owned business at 24 16 percent and for overall, 29 percent 25 so not far from our 30 percent goal, DIAMOND REPORTING 718 624-7200 info@diamondreporting.com

28 1 Proceedings 2 and on the date of this report the actual numbers are 2 percent for minority business enterprise participation, 4 percent for women owned business administration for A combined total of six percent thus far. As you know, the project has just 9 started so the numbers are low at this 1.0 point, and as far as the work force 11 participation is concerned, we are 12 currently at nonminority employees, 13 25.2 percent, minority employees 65.4 14 percent and female, 9.4 percent. So MWBE Minority and Women Owned 15 16 Business Enterprise participation. 17 MS. ANDERSON: Is that it? MS. WILKERSON: That is it. I 18 19 apologize if it was rushed. ${\tt MS.}$ ANDERSON: Any questions for 2.0 21 Paula? No? Okay. Thank you, Paula. 22 We have one more legal update. 12	So OxBlue was procured as a sole
13	source because of the unique
1 4	combination of hardware with associated
15	services and software.
16	OxBlue is providing security
17	camera hardware and services that will
18	be used to monitor and secure the new
19	school construction site.
20	These site security measures
21	allowed for a lower rate on the
22	builders risk insurance, which is paid
2 3	for by the Joint School Construction
2 4	Board.
2 5	These construction site security

2	measures are also important for
3	securing and protecting the City, the
4	construction site, including the
5	materials stored on the site and
6	preventing anything from happening on
7	the site that could delay progress or
8	result in additional cost, and for
9	protecting the public on the site that
10	could delay progress or result in
11	additional cost, and for protecting the
12	public safety as well.
